Black Women's Expo: That's What's Up, Buckle Up!

The 20th Annual Black Women's Expo was held at McCormick Place on March 28-30, 2014. The 3-day event was quite an experience with appearances by Lisa Raye, Robin Roberts, Chef David Blackmon, and Erica Campbell just to name a few. Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) along with Safe Communities for Illinois (SCIL) were there as part of the weekend long fun and activities! The Black Women's Expo attracted approximately 45,000 people and we took the opportunity to educate anyone who walked our way. Every booth had a different mission for being there whether it was to sell beauty and fashion products or promote health and wellness. IDOT's and SCIL's joint mission was to raise public awareness of the dangers of risky behaviors while driving.

What are considered risky behaviors? Texting while driving and drinking while driving, (we referred it to as "drixting"), and not buckling up are some most noted risky behaviors that can cause fatalities. According to the National Highway Transportation Safety

Administration, on any given time of day, about 800,000 people are using hand-held cell phones while driving. Additionally, drivers using hand-held cellphones are four times more likely to cause accidents that result in injuries. These were the kind of messages we educated and delivered to the attendees at the Black Women's Expo. People who stopped by the IDOT/SCIL booth were handed goodies like ear buds, pencils, bumper stickers, brochures, bracelets, and even a picture of themselves reminding them to *click it or ticket* and *phone in one hand, will get you a ticket in the other*.

IDOT/SCIL's mission was to enlighten the public on the importance of wearing a seat belt, not to text, drink AND drive and I believe our mission was accomplished!
